# **Don't Forget SPAC**

The NAPS resident officers were honored to be present at the White House on April 6 when President Joe Biden signed H.R. 3076, the Postal Service Reform Act of 2022, into law. NAPS members can be proud of their advocacy over the years that helped push this bill over the finish line.

But NAPS' legislative efforts don't stop there. In late July, Executive Vice President Chuck Mulidore met with Sen. Susan Collins (R-ME), Sen. Steve Daines (R-MT) and House Oversight and Reform Committee Chair Carolyn Maloney, thanking them for their continued support of NAPS and the Postal Service.

He also met with Rep. Val Demmings, the Florida Democratic candidate for the U.S Senate, and Valerie Foushee, a Democratic member of the North Carolina Senate who is running for election to the U.S. House to represent North Carolina's 4th Congressional District. SPAC funds open doors and provide opportunities to meet with candidates to garner support for NAPS' legislative agenda.

More legislation is needed. As NAPS Director of Legislative & Political Affairs Bob Levi highlighted in his June *Postal Supervisor* column, H.R. 1623, the Postal Supervisors and Managers Fairness Act, would ensure EAS employees are treated with the dignity and respect to which they are entitled in the consultative process with the Postal Service.

One of the most important ways to ensure NAPS' influence and advocacy on Capitol Hill is through the Supervisors' Political Action Committee. Visit the SPAC booth in the Celestin Ballroom foyer to make a contribution.

Also available are two challenge coins. For a \$25 contribution, you will get a specially designed NAPS New Orleans Challenge Coin. California is offering a challenge coin to celebrate its 100th state convention. Both are available at the SPAC table.

### What, Exactly, Is Bid Whist?

Sunday evening at 6 p.m., the Host Branch Committee is hosting a Bid Whist Tournament in Imperial 5. Some NAPS members may not be familiar with the game. Bid whist is based on the classic card game whist, but with a bidding element.

In classic whist, a standard 52-card pack is used; cards in each suit rank from highest (ace) to lowest (2). There are four players who play in two partnerships.

All the cards are dealt face down. The final card, which belongs to the dealer, is turned face up to indicate which suit is

trumps. The player to the dealer's left leads to the first trick with any card in the hand. The other players, in clockwise order, each play a card to the trick and must follow suit by playing a card of the suit led, if held.

A player with no card of the suit may play any card, either discarding or trumping. The trick is won by the highest card of the suit, unless a trump is played, in which case the highest trump wins. The winner of the trick leads the next trick.

Play continues until all 13 tricks are played, at which point the score is recorded. Part of the skill is a player's ability to remember what cards have been played and figure out what cards remain. Once each trick is played, its cards are turned face down and kept in a stack of four near the player who won the trick.

Before the next trick starts, a player may ask to review the cards from the last trick only. Once the lead card is played, no previously played cards can be reviewed.

After all the tricks have been played, the side that won more tricks scores one point for each trick won in excess of six. A game is over when one team reaches a score of five.

In bid whist, there are four exceptions. First, instead of the trump card being determined by random, the trump suit, or even if there will be a trump suit, for a given hand is determined by the outcome of the bidding process.

Second, whether a trick is won by the higher-ranking card of the winning suit or by the lower-ranking card of that suit also is determined by the outcome of the bidding process. Third, whether the ace is the highest- or lowest-ranking card of the suit can change from hand to hand, depending on whether higher- or lower-ranking cards win in that hand. And fourth, scoring is different.

Bid whist takes skill and strategy. Players cannot tell their partners out loud what they want them to play, but there are non-verbal cues partners give each other.

NAPS' tournament format is a singleelimination, team contest. The first round will be a best two-out-of-three format; all subsequent rounds will be one-game/winner advances. Each team paid a \$20 fee; half the proceeds will go to SPAC.
